VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Vocational Education and Training (VET) in India is organised through the formal, informal and non-formal sector. VET delivery occurs in different forms, according to different target groups and the skill needs of the learners. Amongst the various Ministries, the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship (MOSDE) and the Ministry of Education (MOE), Government of India are responsible for the majority of the skill development schemes and programmes. VET provisions made through the schools, colleges and universities come

under the purview of the Department of School Education and Literacy and Department of Higher Education of

the MoE. The vocational education and training provided through Polytechnics, Industrial Training Institutes, Jan Shikshan Sansthans, National Institute for Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development comes under MOSDE. Schools provide an environment to the learners for systematic acquisition of knowledge, skills and attitude required to meet the varied aspirational needs and educational goals. The school-based vocational education programmes provide training for

entry-level qualifications in various occupations.

Vocationalisation of education, which refers to the inclusion of those practical subjects or courses, which shall generate among the students some basic knowledge, skills and disposition that prepare them to think of becoming skilled workers or entrepreneurs is being implemented under the Samagra Shiksha - an integrated scheme of school education. It is designed to provide diverse educational opportunities and career pathways and improve learning outcomes in occupational skills.


Vocational Education and Training (VET) system is recognised to prepare and develop skilled manpower to meet the growing demands of labour market. VET focuses on specific job roles and imparts practical knowledge and skills, which allow individuals to engage in specific occupational activities. It is not only vital for providing employment opportunities to individuals but also helps in enhancing productivity in industries.

The vocational subjects were introduced under the revised scheme of vocationalisation of secondary and higher secondary education in 2012, with one job roles across Grades 9 to 12 (4-year pattern). The scheme was subsumed in Samagra Shiksha in 2018, along with Sara Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA) and Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA).


There has been increased emphasis on Vocational Education in the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020). The NEP-2020 envisages re-imaging of Vocational Education to provide a due social status and for developing a system for integration of Vocational Education with General Education.

ABOUT HANDICRAFTS AND CARPET SECTOR


Handicrafts & Carpet sector represents the rich culture and heritage of our country. The skillful development of craft is a work of creativity and patience. The method of production in this sector is mostly traditional, which proves it to be a skill-intensive locale. Artisans working in this sector are based in clusters around the nation. The handicrafts hold a special place in the market because of its essence of development contributing a substantial percentage to the GDP. Moreover, handicrafts reflect enormous potential as millions of artisans are engaged in it, across the country. Their skills provide the means for supporting the growing number of new participants in the industry.

Artisans' inherent skill, technique, and traditional craftsmanship are the chief resource of the sector forming the primary platform for production. The planning of the production is generally followed in four phases under quality supervision:



CONTRIBUTION OF HANDICRAFTS AND CARPET SECTOR IN ECONOMY

The Handicrafts and Carpet Sector has been described as an export-oriented sector with approximately 65% and 90% of handcrafted products and carpets respectively exported, earning a value of about Rs. 33253.00 Crores in the year 2021-22. Currently, handicraft sector is significantly moving towards the creation of jobs, with 7.3 million handicraft artisans and approximately 2 million carpet weavers already employed from rural and semi-urban areas.



This sector proves to be economically important from the business point of view. The low capital investment, high ratio of value addition, and high potential for export and foreign exchange earnings for the country, elaborates a bigger picture. Being spread all over the country in rural and urban areas, the industry is highly labor intensive and decentralized. The flexible nature of production allows people, including farmers and other members of the family to engage quickly and also provides opportunity for vertical and horizontal mobility in the sector. Making it prevalent to generations of skilled artisans and family-bound organizations, promoted by Self Help Group (SHGs).



COMPONENTS OF HANDICRAFTS AND CARPET SECTOR

The Handicrafts & Carpet Sector is segmented into following sub-sectors:



This sector offers wide range of products. These items may or may not have functional utility, and are developed on traditional and contemporary themes. Handicrafts are the products developed by manual skills that possesses the creativity of the artisan, and represents cultural beliefs, social symbols and practices.

The sector marks the largest end-use segment denoted by the rising demand for fashion accessories, home accessories and jewellery, among other personal uses. The various sub-sectors of Handicrafts and Carpet Sector accumulates variety of job roles.

Production of diversified jute products of definite shapes and sizes as per sale advice or market demand is the responsibility of the Jute Products Artisan. The artisan should possess knowledge of quality jute crafted product as per customer's given standards.



ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Produce different jute crafted products as per market demand or buyer's specifications.
- Maintain and control quality of the jute products, and ensure dye fastness and fabric quality, while adhering to the specifications and requirements of the product.
- Understand the applications of diversified jute products in different fields of technical textiles, such as packaging textile, agro textile sector, and home textile.
- Ensure that the product is properly finished including colour combinations, design, shape, proportion and size in standardized manner.
- Operate and handle sewing machine, measurement tools and other important tools required for manufacturing diversified jute products.

GRADE - 11

UNIT 01

Introduction to Jute Industry

The handicrafts industry is evolving and the demands are continuously increasing. Hence, the orientation to the industry and its structure becomes an essential knowledge to understand the demands and work on it. This unit also elaborates about the jute industry of India and opportunities in it. Further, the students will also learn about the tools and operations equipped in the industry.



UNIT 02

Understanding Jute Processing

The objective of this unit is to enable students to identify jute fibers, yarns and fabric types and understand the properties to be able to analyse the requirements of the product. Students will also be exposed to production process involved in jute cultivation, selection, fiber, yarn and fabric development techniques and their applications.



UNIT 03

Introduction to Jute Products Artisan

This unit entices students to apply their previously gained knowledge on the practical ground. Students will learn basics of jute production including selection and process of raw materials as per the spec sheet and demand. Accordingly, students will understand pattern making, cutting and constructions of the products, while ensuring work planning and job role of Jute Products Artisan.



UNIT 04

Maintain work area, tools and machines in Handicrafts Sector

In handicraft sector, majority of task are achieved by hand, including the set-up of the operations. This unit introduces to the student it's operations, techniques and storage methods for appropriately handling production. This contributes to quality production, safety of the operator and timely accomplishment of task. Therefore, while handling tools and machines, students will be able to analyse the tools and equipments, with its operations and waste management to better understand the workflow standards.



UNIT 05

Health, safety, and security at workplace in handicraft sector

In this unit, students will learn about the importance of health, safety and security, and its impact on production. Understanding potential hazards and methods to take emergency actions. This unit would enable them to explain about environmental management procedures and security details within a work force or unit.



GRADE - 12

Unit 1: Jute Handicrafts in India

The jute industry is a wide and complex industry in itself, accounting to the variety of products developed and various kind of processes and market involved. The unit discusses the product range, market and consumers to the Jute Handicrafts Industry. This would enhance the students' knowledge about material suitability, and its implications on different spec sheets and requirements, further allowing them to gain knowledge about the scope of Jute industry.





Unit 2: Jute Products Design, Development & Quality Assessment

The unit elaborates study of the aesthetic appeal of the products appropriately such that it does not affect the utility of the product. And students are encouraged to demonstrate designing, planning, and finishing of a jute product. The quality check in the handicrafts sector is also explained in this unit which enables the students to identify finishing standards of a product. Further, the unit discusses about the methods to carry out inspection at all the levels of the production from raw material to final product as per the spec sheet or buyer's requirements.

Unit 3: Development of Jute Products

This unit provides the students an opportunity to develop jute products using different product development techniques using jute fibers, yarns and fabrics. Students would design a product, select appropriate raw material and develop the product according to the spec sheet. As it is important to achieve the final product as per the desired quality, its inspection and the reporting are inculcated in this unit.





Unit 4: Working in a team in Handicrafts Sector

One should aim at building a working environment which provides and maintains the highest degree of physical, mental, and social well-being for workers in all occupations. Hence, the unit allows the students to understand the importance of commitment and trust while handling a job in a team. This unit helps in developing communication with a team, and gain creative understanding while acknowledging self-roles and responsibilities.

Unit 5: Comply with work place requirements in Handicrafts Sector

The growth and worldwide recognition of the handicraft sector of India can be accounted to the considerable domestic and global demand. Hence, importance of the resultant awareness and compliance to code of conduct policies among the Indian handicrafts units are elaborated to the students. Benefits of ethical and value-based approach to management, adherence to the company policies and management of work routines are incorporated into students for better performance.
